

Our mission is to produce machines which inspire creativity and innovation, yet are simple to use. We know the most important thing about our products is not the machines themselves, but what you create with them. The better your tools, the more inventive, artistic and pleasurable your sewing experience.



Adult Beginner: This is usually a first-time quilt. Quilts do not have to be machine quilted, and many times, are tied by the beginner quilter.

Domestic Sewing Machine: If your machine is stationary and the quilt is manipulated during quilting, your machine is considered a "Domestic Machine."

Long Arm Machine: If your sewing machine head moves and the quilt is stationary during quilting, your machine is considered a "Long Arm Machine."

One-person quilt: Quilt constructed entirely by 1 person, to include quilting.

Two-person quilt: More than one person involved in the construction of the quilt or one person making the top, and another quilting it.

Applique Quilt by Machine: A quilt in which the predominant element or design feature is appliqued by machine.

Applique Quilt by Hand: A quilt in which the predominant element or design feature is appliqued by hand.

Original Design: A quilt using your own design not derived from a pattern or other artwork. If the design was derived from a piece of art or another quilt, it is a derivative of someone else's work and not an original design. You may have purchased a pattern and put your own spin on it, but if the original quilter's work is still recognizable in your version, it's a derivative. A quilt created from commercially produced patterns, quilting books, or quilt magazines — even if it's different — is still a derivative, and therefore not original.

Modern Quilt: Includes but is not limited to the use of bold colors and prints, high contrast and graphic areas of solid color, large areas of negative space, improvisational piecing, or an updating of classic quilt designs.

Quilt Kit: Made from a pre-packaged kit.

Commercial Panels & Preprinted

Blocks: Panels and preprinted blocks used within the layout of the quilt.








Category Definitions

Art Quilt Representational: Pictorial in nature and illustrates a recognizable image such as cityscapes, wildlife, nature, or people.

Art Quilt Non-Representational: Abstract in nature with emphasis on color, line, and design. Does not contain recognizable images.

Miscellaneous Quilt Techniques: Whole cloth quilts, crazy quilts, yo-yo quilts, cathedral window quilts, etc.

Embroidery by Hand: A quilt in which the predominant element or design feature is embroidered by hand.

Embroidery by Machine: A quilt in which the predominant element or design feature is embroidered by machine.

Miniature: Quilts with overall patterns reflecting reduced scale and miniaturization. If blocks are used, they should be no larger than 4 inches (10 cm) square. Maximum quilt size is 24" on any side.

Other Quilt Items: Miscellaneous quilted items such as table runners, bags, clothing items, etc.

Junior Division: (Under 15 years) all categories.





Featured Quilter Jeanette Pitalo

Seamstress, Quilter, Teacher

Jeanette's story started many years ago in a small house in Los Angeles, California when a little girl

decided she wanted to sew just like her Nana. Over the last 7 decades, Jeanette Pitalo has made this dream into a reality. From working at JJ Newberry's as a teenager to becoming one of Salem, Oregon's premiere sewing & quilting instructors, she has made sewing and quilting not only an important part of her life but the lives of many others as well. While she and husband Tom raised their two oldest girls, Nanci and Dawn, in Southern California, Jeanette worked at a couple of fabric stores doing everything from teaching to upholstery to management. She also had three home-based sewing & craft businesses during this time. In 1987 Tom and Jeanette packed up their belongings and headed north to Oregon. Not long after moving to Salem, she started working at Greenbaum's Quilted Forest and Whitlock's Vacuum & Sewing Center. She has taught classes in everything from hand quilting to machine embroidery to sewing clothes. One of her longest running teaching stints has been as the main instructor at Greenbaum's Quilt Camps for kids ages 10-16 for the over 25 years. During this time, Tom & Jeanette added to the family by adopting a group of five siblings in 1996. Raising Ben, Valerie, Alicia, Whitney and Holly kept them busy, but Jeanette still had time to keep up with her love of all things sewing. She not only led a yearly trip to the Sisters Quilt Show, she has also been the president of the Mid-Valley Quilt Guild as well as being an integral part of the annual Quiltopia show held at The Willamette Heritage Center. With all of this experience, it's only natural that Jeanette should get into longarm quilting. Teaching Longarm and Quilting for others is something she really enjoys. In 2017 Greenbaum's closed their doors and Jeanette decided to retire from Whitlock's as well. It lasted about 6 months until a visit to Will-N-Beez to talk about Quilt Camps. She thought this is something she would like to continue. So started her time at Will N Beez, Quilt and Coffee Shop, where she's still teaching her love of Quilting and Sewing.



October through March, meetings are in the daytime April through September we meet in the early evening. FEATURED JUDGE: Kathie Kerler is a quilter who embroiders and an embroiderer who quilts. As a graduate of the rigorous three and a half year program in design and embroidery at the City and Guilds Institute of London, she completed both traditional and experimental work. One of the primary takeaways she gained was the importance of sampling—sampling both materials and techniques to determine what best suits the design and project. She has been judging quilts and wearables nationally since 2002 and certified through the National Association of Certified Quilt Judges (NACQJ). Kathie is one of their Qualified Instructors and a passionate teacher of their Two-Day Judging Seminar. She also frequently presents to guilds on this topic. Her goal



is to explain how the evaluation process is meant to encourage and educate, rather than be something to fear.

For seven years, Kathie was a contributing editor to <u>American Quilter</u> magazine, writing over 100 articles on processes, patterns, and interviews, which contributes to her deep quilting knowledge.

Kathie is a native of Portland, Oregon. But for several years she lived in Montréal and Paris, where she studied at 'Ecole Lesage, furthering her embroidery skills. As a member of 20 Perspectives, an international textile art group composed of quilters from ten countries and four continents, she exhibits work internationally.



Marge McCanse is an Oregon native as well as a 4th generation quilter, having learned from her mother, grandmother and great-grandmother. She has been involved in many areas of quilting, ranging from teaching through the 4-H program, Chemeketa, local quilt shops, to making the quilt samples for quilt shops. She is well known for her exquisite hand appliqué, as well as her pieced quilts. She was an original member of MVQG (some 32 years ago!)

Patty Pynch has been quilting since 2000 and favors Jo Morton patterns and Civil War fabrics. She gives away her quilts to her extended family, is a member of Mid-Valley Quilt Guild and a small Stitch n' Bitch group with local friends. She and her husband, who was born and raised in Stayton, Oregon, moved from Olympia, Washington ten years ago to be close to family. She has a son, daughter, and three grand girls all living in Washington.





Laurie Hatfield entered the fabric and quilting industry later in life, after working with stained glass and woodworking for decades. She quickly fell in love with the immense variety of fabrics and soon purchased a longarm quilting machine and started a business quilting for others. A few years later she added a multi-needle embroidery machine to her business and both machines are operating most days. Additionally, Laurie has taught beginning and intermediate quilting classes. Laurie has won numerous ribbons and awards at local and state fairs, quilt shows, and fabric industry competitions.

Reba Worotikan was born and raised in the Pacific Northwest. She grew up watching her mother sew and soon was sewing quilts and clothing herself. In 1988, she met her future husband, Albert – a fellow college student who had recently moved to the United States from his home country of Indonesia. After they got married, the two moved back to Indonesia where they would give birth to their first child and live for the next five years. Quilts of Valor Quilts = Healing!

Salem Star Valor Quilters

The Mission of Quilts of Valor Foundation is to cover Service Members with comforting and healing Quilts of Valor.

The Foundation was founded by Catherine Roberts after she literally had a dream. "The dream was as vivid as real life. I saw a young man sitting on the side of his bed in the middle of the night, hunched over. The permeating feeling was one of utter despair. I could see his war demons clustered around, dragging him down into an emotional gutter. Then, as if viewing a movie, I saw him in the next scene wrapped in a quilt. His whole demeanor changed from one of despair to one of hope and well-being. The quilt made this dramatic change. The message of my dream was: *Quilts = Healing*. The model appeared simple: have a volunteer team who would donate their time and materials to make a quilt. One person would piece the top and the other would quilt it. I saw the name for this special quilt: it was Quilt of Valor, a QOV."

These quilts are 60" x 80" are presented to service members or veterans to provide comfort and healing. Service members are nominated to receive a quilt and the quilt is then presented. Catherine Roberts said "I knew a Quilt of Valor had to be a quality-made quilt, not a "charity quilt". A Quilt of Valor had to be quilted, not tied, which meant hand or machine quilting It would be "awarded," not just passed out like magazines or videos, and would say unequivocally, "Thank you for your service, sacrifice and valor in serving our nation."

Star Valor Quilters of Oregon was established in 2018 by the owners of Will-n-Bee'z Quilt and Coffee Shoppe. Jeff and Mary realized that there was not a Quilt of Valor group in our Capitol City of Salem, Oregon. So, both being from military backgrounds, they decided to change that. It started small, and grew every year, until Covid-19 came about in 2020. Even though most other groups stopped presenting quilts, Jeff and Mary did not. The group kept presenting no matter what needed to be done to get the quilts to the Vets. Some were placed on front porches, while the recipients stayed away and watched as the awards were read from a distance. Others were awarded via Zoom, while no person to person contact was allowed.

The Salem Star Valor Quilters of Oregon is over 40 members strong. They meet once a month on the second Monday of each month. The largest endeavor to date was on Veterans Day 2022. The group, along with other volunteers presented almost 100 quilts to local Veterans at the Salem Armory. This brings the groups total to around 320 Quilts of Valor Quilts delivered in the last four years!
